Congratulations to Olivia from 1st Arlesey Guides for winning the County round of Guiding Star!

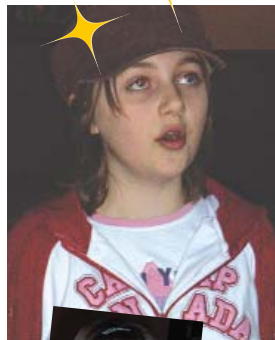
Eight acts from across Bedfordshire put on a storming show on Annual Review Day, showing real star potential. Everyone had a great afternoon - well done to everyone who took part.

Baden Powell Award

Congratulations to Emily from 1st Shillington Guides who has just completed her Baden Powell Challenge Award - the highest award for a guide.

Emily completed 10 challenges from five themes: healthy lifestyles; global awareness; discovery; skills and relationships; and celebrating diversity. She gained her agility and world culture badges, planned a 'reflections' session for her patrol, organised a team games session, went to the Big Gig and told everyone else about it, organised parachute games and helped the unit celebrate Chinese New Year.

The final part of her award was to take part in a special weekend with other Bedfordshire guides. Here's Emily's story:

I arrived on a cold November morning to be greeted by Moley, Woozle, Badger and Kanga - our leaders for the weekend. Our theme was Hallowe'en and Bonfire Night, and so all tasks were linked to this theme. I was in the Catherine Wheels patrol. First job was to erect our tent - luckily it was a lightweight one which was easy to put up. Our first activity was decorating candles using wax crayons that we melted in tea lights. We made little guys out of wool wrapped around card, which we had to wear on our jumpers for the rest of the weekend. Then we had our lunch of chicken casserole and rice, followed by apple crumble, and the washing up!

In the evening we had an incident hike. We set off from camp at 7pm in our groups at 10 minute intervals. We were given a map and co-ordinates and had to find our way to each base and had a task to complete at each to earn points. The group who made it back to camp with the most points would be the winner. We eventually got back to the hut at 1.15am for our supper of hot dogs, and returned to camp at 2.15am. Hot water bottles were filled and beds were rolled out as guides took off all their layers and climbed into bed.

We were woken the next day at 8am sharp. After breakfast we were blindfolded and had to find our way through a rope course to the guys each patrol had made the previous day. Then each patrols had to light a fire using only one firelighter and a match and all three fires were then joined together and we burnt our guys. We cooked burgers on disposable barbeques with special cake for pudding which had been made to celebrate us finishing our BP.

After the tents were taken down and our belongings were packed away it was almost time for us to leave. We were each given a certificate and the winners of the weekend were announced. The Catherine Wheels had won!

Annual Review Rowgirl

Sleeping bags and cups of tea - two things we Guiders hold close to our hearts. But what if your sleeping bag was soaked through and there was 3,000 miles of ocean between you and your next cuppa? That's the situation Claire Mills found herself in as she joined a four-woman team, the Rowgirls - on a quest to row across the Atlantic.

Claire, a former Brownie from Dunstable and now a teacher in Norwich, held the Annual Review audience enthralled as she told us about the ups and downs of her inspiring 10-week adventure. She and her three crew mates were aiming to be the first four woman team to cross the Atlantic Ocean - and it wasn't easy.

The tiny boat they were living on contained everything they needed for the trip, including plenty of dehydrated food and equipment to make sea water drinkable - not exactly tempting fare.

The crossing was also hard work, with each crew member rowing for 12 hours a day, on a two hours on, two hours off rota. When they were able to sleep in their cramped cabin, bad weather could mean they found themselves in soggy sleeping bags.

The team's journey from the Canary Islands to Antigua was nothing if not eventful. Fifty foot waves battered the boat, a man-eating shark took a nibble out of it, they lost their rudder and faced the crushing disappointment of one of their team having to leave the race after she injured her back. Disqualified from the race, Claire and her team decided to carry on and instead become the first three-woman crew to finish the crossing.

Their arrival in Antigua was a tearful reunion after such a long time away, and there was a huge Victoria sponge waiting!

On the University of Birmingham website, Claire describes herself as 'An outdoor girl with a passion for rugby and lip-gloss alike, never one to turn down a challenge.' And it's that passion for a challenge, as well as appreciation for a good cuppa, that I think struck a real chord at the Annual Review. Kelly Quigley

Life in the 'Big Sister House' Volunteering at Our Chalet

"Ooh, you lucky thing!" was most people's reaction to the news that I had been offered a month working at Our Chalet.

I accepted exploitation of my labour in return for subsidised time in a privileged location. But there were surprises in store for me when, after six months of anticipation, I finally arrived there.

Our Chalet has magnificent views from its position at the head of a valley - up to snow-capped peaks and across to a village of traditional chalets sprinkled across the lower slopes. However, this remoteness can also have its drawbacks.

The half-hour hike to the little town centre dissuades guests and staff alike from getting out after dark. The gradient down the valley is steep and I was too tired to contemplate it after 9pm, which was the time we finished work most evenings.

For three days I didn't get out at all, such were the work demands. It then occurred to me I was living in the 'Big Sister House'! There were nightly activities for the guests presented by us, despite having been up at 7am to prepare breakfast!

When days off came round it cost from £30-£50 to ski for the day depending on whether you chose cross-country or down-hill style. I managed one day of each and took the train to Zurich another day, taking advantage of a £15 pound day pass to travel anywhere in Switzerland. That was more relaxing!

I hadn't anticipated how awkward it would be

live and work 24 hours a day with girls mostly half my age. My stamina didn't match theirs nor did our interests coincide much. Their relaxation was DVDs and Gluhwein, sometimes into the early hours. My room was directly above the lounge, not wanting to be a killjoy I had to invest in some earplugs!

An unexpected afternoon off saw us dashing up the mountain with the chalet's sledges for a run down the 2.5 km sledge route. The departure of a long-term member of staff also gave us a reason to perform a sketch and have a party. The rest of the time we slogged away cleaning, preparing food and washing up, doing our best to please the management, the guests and each other. I actually cooked a roast dinner for 55 one night when the cook had time off, something I would never have tackled at home.

Communication was not always easy or harmonious, but we had to cotton on quickly as the accommodation filled to its capacity of 70 people. With only four paid staff and five volunteers on a rota we were under pressure, tempers began to fray and I lost it once or twice. Lucky for me I was not on TV!

What really irked me was the lack of freedom. I sneaked out as often as possible to walk the local area in search of sights and encounters.

This year is our Chalet's 75th Anniversary and once visited it leaves a lasting impression. For me it was not as exciting or romantic as I had anticipated but it took me out of my comfort zone in ways I had not thought of.

Life in the Big Sister House may sound fun but it's tougher than you think! If you feel up to the challenge and are over 18, Our Chalet welcomes volunteers all year round for periods from two weeks to three months. Visit www.ourchalet.ch
