Anglia International Trip - Russia 28th July- 12th August 2004

Last year I attended the Anglia Region International selection weekend at Pax Lodge and just before Christmas I was offered a place on a trip to Russia.

The trip was to the city of Ufa to camp with Russian Girl Scouts and to Moscow, as a group of 10 Guides and Young Leaders from across Anglia with 2 group leaders. We met as a group only twice before our departure, once for the day and then for a weekend camp in Norfolk. We chose to have polo shirts and jumpers made and we designed a group logo, which we also had made into badges.

We left from Heathrow on 28th July, flying to Moscow, where we spent the next three days. We arrived just after midnight and I then discovered that my bag had been delayed. It did not arrive until 8 days later, half way through the camp!



We stayed in the 1980 Olympic hotel and whilst in Moscow we visited the Red Square, Lenin's tomb, the Kremlin, a Russian Orthodox monastery, a craft market and the Bolshoi Theatre where we saw Swan Lake.

Late Saturday night, we left Moscow on an internal flight for Ufa, where we were met by Russian Girl Scout leaders. We stayed with the leaders and their families for 2 days. I stayed with three others from our group with Albina, Bulat and their 6-year-old daughter, Alijah who lived on the

edge of the city. We went into Ufa and spent the evening picking cherries in the garden.

The next morning we travelled on buses to the camp, which was being held in a school to encourage local school children to join Girl Scout units. We stayed in dormitory rooms in the school building and outside there was a stage basketball court, surrounded by a forest.

The camp lasted 8 days and there were 90 participants including 3 American leaders. We were split into patrols to do activities and every evening we put on plays or other entertainment on the stage, including Snow White as a pantomime! Every other night we had a campfire and on the last night we found our secret friends, whose name we had given on the first day to look out for all week. We visited a museum and one afternoon a group of dancers in traditional dress came to the camp. They showed us a traditional wigwam like home, dress, crafts and even made us drink horses milk! We also visited a geyser and showed the Russians songs, games and activities from England.

After the camp, we spent 2 more days with the leaders and their families, during which we were interviewed by the regions news programme. We spent another day in the city before going to a room in the basement of a block of flats where their unit meetings are held to say goodbye to our new-found friends before leaving early the next morning, arriving home the following evening.
